SOS Children's Villages Sri Lanka has begun preparations to commemorate the 40th Anniversary of its presence in Sri Lanka in year 2021.



# SOS CHILDREN'S VILLAGES OFFERS A LENDING HAND TO STRUGGLING SRI LANKANS



COVID-19 was an unprecedented pandemic that hit Sri Lanka in the mid-week of March. The country never saw such a predicament in its history, thus making it an extreme challenge for the government to counter the problem with necessary measures such as medical and quarantine facilities, social support systems, safety regulations etc. Yet, the Sri Lankan government did its best in tackling the pandemic with available resources.

SOS Children's Villages Sri Lanka was able to do its part to the best of its capabilities in contributing to the social support system dynamic of the matter via its Family Strengthening Programme. Currently, there are 1537 families benefitting from this programme through 9 different locations scattered across the country. Predominantly, these families live below the poverty line, engaged in daily labour, street vending, farming, fishing, and other types of work that yield a meagre income. Out of them, 1271 families were identified as in need of urgent support during the lockdown period since the curfew had stripped them of their daily income. In addition, they did not have a secondary source of income to sustain themselves through these times. The survey to identify these families was conducted by SOS Children's Villages in coordination with preexisting Community Based Organizations (CBO)

that were initially set up by SOS Family Strengthening Centres in respective locations. Despite of the strict curfew imposed, SOS Children's Villages was able to provide all 1271 families with relief packages. Each package contained rice, canned fish, spices, and dry rations. This was a life-saver for them: one could only wonder how long they would have had to bear hunger if these packages hadn't reached them on time. The biggest challenge was to organize the required purchases and arrange deliveries of these relief packages to identified families in need without breaking curfew regulations. This was overcome with the support received from government authorized wholesalers who also offered to make deliveries using their own vehicles which had special curfew passes. Not just relief packages, these families were also distributed leaflets indicating clearly all precautionary measures that needs to be taken to protect themselves from the coronavirus. They were also provided with safety items such as face masks and hand wash. At a time when almost all economic activities had come to a standstill, it was no easy feat to organize such community projects. Fortunately, the confidence and reputation the government and the community has on SOS Children's Villages helped SOS staff a lot when coordinating these activities.

Deliveries began on the 2nd of April that ensured all 1271 families received the aid they were hopefully waiting for with much expectation. It is noteworthy that all of this was done without making direct contact with the beneficiaries, but instead through efficient and effective coordination carried out by staff of SOS Children's Villages, especially the ones involved in the Family Strengthening Programme. This endeavor would not have been possible without the involvement of the National Director of SOS Children's Villages and all Project and Village Heads who worked together as one SOS Family to make this a reality.



## BURSTING THROUGH OBSTACLES STORY OF WASANTHI SEYA - AN OUT OF CARE YOUTH



"I felt the warmth of a lady who asked me to call her 'mother'. I used to think to myself: so this is how the love of a mother feels like."

Wasanthi Seya was brought to SOS Children's Village Piliyandala in August of 1993. The sudden change in environment from an institution to a place called 'home' disconcerted her a little. She needed time to adapt and accept the change. And with time she didn't just accept it, but also grew fond of it. Wasanthi grew up with five others like her, sent to SOS Children's Villages to have a family. They called each other 'Ayya', 'Malli', 'Akka', 'Nangi'; and although not by blood, they were still siblings by bond, love, and care.

"My mother used to cry and get emotional when I refused to eat, and I remember getting sick quite often after coming to my new home. I was rushed to the nearest clinic whenever I wasn't feeling well. At SOS, everything was different. I got to wear clothes that I like, my mother cooked for everyone in the house, I went to school with my brothers and sisters, and slept in my own room. I completely forgot my past and where I came from. This was my home and this was my family. As I grew older, I understood that I was living at what is called 'SOS Children's Villages' - a childcare organization, but it didn't matter anymore. This was my family and I didn't care what anyone said about it."

Wasanthi grew up happily at SOS Children's Villages in her home, loved by her mother and siblings. At age 18 she was transferred to the girls youth home of SOS Children's Villages where young girls are taught to take care of themselves and gradually be independent. It was during this time that she partook and won all-island first place at a drawing competition! Their mentor at the girls' youth home identified her creative skills and sent her for training at a salon where Wasanthi was eventually recruited as a beautician.

"I learned everything I could and didn't stop there. I went on to follow many courses in cosmetology using my hard earned money as a beautician. I must say I got a lot of encouragement from my mother and senior staff at SOS whom we call 'uncle' and 'aunty'. Of course, there were many hearsay from the community about where I came from, but I stayed focused. I left the girls' home after two years and rented out a small house. My siblings and I brought our mother to our new house and cared for her when she fell sick."

After eight years at the salon Wasanthi had to face an obstacle life threw at her. She was readv for it, because she knew her 'SOS Family' would be there for her.

"The salon was facing many difficulties and we were asked to resign. I felt dejected and heavy-hearted, wondering what to do next. I thought to myself, 'why not set up my own salon?' It wasn't easy. Despite many obstacles, I finally managed to open my salon and I have never felt such a sense of self-fulfillment before. Everything was elemental since I had just started up. There were some who scoffed at my new salon saving 'vou call this a salon?' But I didn't let such words get in my head. Those same people admire it now since I worked hard and gradually made it more professional. You have to prove the naysayers with your success. My formula for life is: be fair and confident. And no short-cuts."

Wasanthi is a proud owner of a professional salon and has built her own house. From a lonely child without parents to a professional business-woman full of confidence, skill, and talent; SOS Children's Villages is proud to call her their child.

Accolades secured were for 'Best Island-wide Private Sector Training Provider' and 'Best Private Sector Training Provider for Uva Province'.

In the second week of July, it was announced by the Registrar General's Department to remove the 'marital status' question of parents from the new digital birth certificate as it causes prejudice to youth with their biological parents in square This was an achievement for SOS their biological parents in question. (GNG) network (a group of individuals who grew up at childcare institutions) that pushed for this removal backed by SOS Children's Villages Sri Lanka.
